YDI VALENCIA TEEN COURT PROGRAM NARRATIVE (FY13)

DELAYS/BARRIERS/CHALLENGES

- 1. Referrals were a little low this month as no school was in progress.
- 2. Expanding Teen Court to better serve the community continues to be challenging without a full-time employee.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS/SUCCESSES

- 1. Several guest judges and community leaders (Jaime Baca, Father Mundy, to name a few) observed Teen Court in preparation for future Teen Court.
- 2. The Teen Court Manager presented components of Teen Court to attendees at the Juvenile Justice Board Meeting.
- 3. YDI-Valencia Teen Court received three referrals (two from Otero County and one from Bernalillo County) for misdemeanors committed outside of Valencia County by teens that live in Valencia County.
- 4. The Teen Court Coordinator met with Connie Elsberry of In 2 Dance Co. to discuss adding interpretative dance as a sanction (similar to that of TNT's mentoring role). This sanction should be available for October Teen Court.
- 5. More teens who have successfully completed the program have expressed an interest to continue as teen court attorneys.
- 6. The tracking and monitoring system developed by the TC coordinator has proven to be effective as teens call in every two weeks to report on their community service progress. As more sanctions become available, more supervised community service options will be included in the Teen Court Calendar.
- 7. Teen Court defendants and volunteers are preparing for another animal adoption and Belen Park clean up.
