YDI VALENCIA TEEN COURT PROGRAM NARRATIVE (FY13)

DELAYS/BARRIERS

- 1. Because the number of Teen Court defendants for June 6 was low (only 4 referrals) and one client was a no-show for court, the jury pool for July 11 Teen Court is low, thus necessitating further recruitment of volunteers for upcoming Teen Court.
- 2. The Teen court facilitator returned two non-compliant cases back to JPO.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS/SUCCESSES

- 1. While the numbers were low in early June, by late June the number of referrals doubled. 10 new clients were received from JPO.
- 2. The Teen Court facilitator met with Lindsey Lucero (JPOS) about revising sanctions and lowering court fees. This meeting was highly successful as they also discussed the possibility of direct referrals from the school.
- 3. Sanction partnership with Valencia County Animal Shelter has been very successful.
 - a. Teen Court defendants volunteered an average of four to five hours of community service at Starbuck's on June 8. Their efforts and hard work have resulted in a number of successful adoptions-and, to date-they have raised approximately \$1,000 to help relocate animals to a no-kill shelter in Colorado.
- 4. Some of the Teen Court defendants have also expressed an interest in becoming more involved with other programs that YDI can offer-the Teen Outreach Program (TOP), for example.
- 5. The Teen Court facilitator met with Lenore Pena (City of Belen) and has scheduled two dates in June for Teen Court defendants to perform community service by co-adopting Anna Becker Park with Scoutreach.
- 6. The Teen Court Program Manager has been training teen attorneys in small groups of 3 or 4 to better help them understand and prepare for trial, and Judge Tina Garcia noted the teen attorney's improvement by complimenting them on their detailed and argumentative opening and closing statements.
- 7. The Teen Court facilitator received approval to attend the 8th Global Justice Teen Court Conference in Las Vegas, December 3-5.
 - a. By attending this conference, the facilitator hopes to enhance teen court process and training, learn more about grant sources, etc., with the ultimate goal of expanding Teen Court to reach more youth in Valencia County.
- 8. The number of teens who have completed the program successfully yet want to volunteer beyond sanctions has doubled from 3 to 6 this month. This figure might indicate an internalization or "long-term buy-in" for civic engagement.
